We Serve in the Community

Go to a public event like Feria Telemundo in Tampa or Children's Week in Tallahassee, and you will find Sunshine Health employees behind tables, handing out everything from Ambetter sunglasses to Sunshine Health bookbags.

They are members of our Community Affairs team, and their mission goes far beyond distributing swag at community events.

They serve as brand ambassadors to our providers, members and community partners. They help connect members with community resources and check in on providers to ensure they have the information they need to serve our members effectively and efficiently.

While the Provider Partnership Management (PPM) team is our primary conduit to providers, the Community Affairs team supplements their efforts, logging 1,600+ provider visits in 2018.

They also forge connections with nonprofit groups that support underserved populations to remove barriers to health.

The team concentrates on building relationships with organizations whose missions align with ours, such as Healthy Start and March of Dimes.

The Community Affairs team's expertise comes from each representative understanding the unique regions where they live and serve.





Strong Youth, Strong Communities

Sunshine Health hit the road with NFL Legend Darrell Green and the Pro Football Hall of Fame in August 2018, sharing stories of overcoming obstacles to achieve goals and listening to teens' concerns as part of Strong Youth, Strong Communities (SYSC) sessions.

SYSC is a partnership between Centene and the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The events were supported by Urban League affiliates across Florida and dozens of community partners. Joining Green were fellow Hall of Famers Anthony Muñoz and Aeneas Williams, and University of North Carolina star basketball player Iman McFarland.

Jacksonville

McFarland, speaking to 150+ teens at the Ritz Theatre and Museum in Jacksonville, said she was a "student-athlete" not an "athlete-student."

"That sport was a vehicle to get into college," McFarland told the teens. She is now Chief Operations Officer of the 21st Century Expo Group.

Anthony Muñoz, who played in two Super Bowls with the Cincinnati Bengals, inspired the kids with his stories of perseverance.

"There's a passion there to make a difference and to change lives — and that's why we're part of the team," Muñoz

said of SYSC.

In the second part of each session, the teens divided into smaller groups with Green, McFarland, Muñoz or Williams. They talked about how what they heard related to their lives. In the Jacksonville group of 15- and 16-year-old boys, Edward from Lee High School shared the lesson he would take home: "Do things for yourself. Your actions are for you."

Orlando

Teenage energy permeated the gym as 1,800 Jones High students shuffled in at 2 p.m. on a Friday. Jones High School has a rich history in the black community. It was the first public school for African-American students in Orlando.

Breakout sessions were larger than entire SYSC groups usually are. In a session of about 300 kids, who were at first reluctant to speak, Williams listened while a female officer hugged students who had the courage to speak.

One teen said her sister, who had a



6-month-old baby, was murdered. Another spoke of never meeting her dad and being afraid her mom would die from drugs, leaving her alone. One young man spoke of how it is hard to do well in school when his friends don't take it seriously.

After the sessions, all 1,800 students came back into the auditorium. Some wiped away tears while others, restless as Friday drew to a close, joked amongst themselves.

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Fort Lauderdale

SYSC's last Florida stop was Aug. 25 in Fort Lauderdale, where the Urban League of Broward County hosted the event in the Sunshine Health Community Empowerment Center. More than 250 teens with groups like the Pace Center for Girls and the Palm Beach Urban League attended.

During an exercise with Green, it was clear the teens didn't give up their Saturday afternoon to get autographs. Few could name the legendary athletes in front of them. They were there for a chance to learn from adults who had achieved their dreams.

In Green's breakout session of 17- and 18-year-old boys, a Dillard High School football player said he's worried for some of his friends. "While we are spending all this time playing video games, we could be reading books, getting a 4.0 and going

to college. ... You have to try hard even when you're tired, on and off the field."

When one teen said, "I'm just afraid I'm not going to make it," his friend stood up and reassured him, "I think what they said is, we're building our own standards. We can make it."

At the end of the Florida tour, Green put three marks in the win column.

"These kids have an intellect. We're here to wake it up. To plant the seed. If we get that seed planted they can decide what they want to do for the rest of their lives."



Urban League

In addition to Strong Youth, Strong Communities, Sunshine Health partnered with Urban League affiliates throughout Florida on a number of events in 2018, including:

- Supporting the Urban League of Broward
 County in events for new and expecting
 moms, giving them health information,
 connecting them with community resources
 and more.
- Partnering with the Jacksonville Urban League on "Building Safer Communities! Our Block, Our Community, Our Responsibility." This event brought together

- community members of all ages to discuss proactive ways to make their community safer.
- A member of our Community Affairs Team sits on the Jacksonville Urban League Community Forum Committee. The group seeks to bridge the gap between law enforcement and the community to implement youth crime prevention strategies.
- "Team Baby" prep camp for new moms in Jacksonville, in partnership with Jacksonville Urban League and the Northeast Florida Healthy Start Coalition.



No One Eats Alone

More than 900 middle school students rushed into the cafeteria at Darnell-Cookman School of the Medical Arts in Jacksonville on Feb. 9, 2018, for "National No One Eats Alone Day," a Centenesponsored initiative created by the nonprofit Beyond Differences.

The day was created to teach students inclusiveness, especially during lunch, which can be the most difficult part of the school day for kids who feel like they don't fit in.

The students, in grades 6-8, were excited as they scrambled to sit with students they don't know at our request. We joined them to get their conversations started, but we didn't need to — the kids were happy to make new friends.

March of Dimes

Sunshine Health once again teamed up with the March of Dimes to support March for Babies events throughout Florida to raise awareness of the importance of preventing premature births.

March for Babies raises money to treat infants in the neonatal intensive care unit (NICU); to fund programs that support mothers and families; and to pay for research to prevent premature births.

"Approximately one out of every 10 babies born in Florida is born too soon — a rate that isn't improving," said Debra Smyers, Sunshine Health's Senior Vice President of Strategic Initiatives and a board member of the Broward March of Dimes.

"At the walks each year, our employees meet former March of Dimes babies who are growing and thriving, and we know we are making a difference," she said.
"But we've got to do more."

Sunshine Health was the presenting sponsor of the Broward March for Babies and also supported walks in Jacksonville, Orlando, Pensacola and Tampa.
Statewide, Sunshine Health employees raised \$35,158 for the cause.

Orange Bowl Committee

To support healthy, active lifestyles, Sunshine Health supports the Orange Bowl Committee and its year-round efforts to improve the health of the community through youth sports and wellness activities for all ages.

The Orange Bowl Family Fun & Fit Day presented by Sunshine Health is a free annual community event that includes a day of family fun and fitness. Held on Aug. 4, 2018, at the Betty T. Ferguson Recreational Complex in Miami Gardens, it featured a youth football clinic, more than 60 vendors, food trucks, music,

games, bounce houses and face painting for kids. The event also includes a big back-to-school component. Children received free haircuts and backpacks filled with school supplies.

With an increasing rate of childhood obesity, Sunshine Health partners with the Orange Bowl Committee to support activities that include exercise, play and team building.

The Orange Bowl Youth Football Alliance is home to more than 13,000 football players and cheerleaders in eight South Florida leagues.



Florida Coalition for Children

The Florida Coalition for Children (FCC) was a crucial community partner to Sunshine Health in 2018.

The nonprofit organization, located in Tallahassee, advocates on behalf of all of Florida's abused, abandoned, neglected and at-risk children and supports agencies and individuals throughout the state who work on children's behalf.

As the Training Sponsor for the FCC's Rally in Tally, we supported groups advocating for children as Florida's lawmakers headed into the 2018 session.

As title sponsor of the FCC's annual conference in Boca Raton in July, we joined more than 600 people from groups advocating for Florida's children to share best practices, resources, training and supports. And, at that conference, we had the honor of being named FCC's

Corporate Partner of the Year!

With the FCC, we also hosted One Voice IMPAACT's inspirational youth performances at several events.

After Hurricane Michael devastated the Panhandle, we worked with the FCC on an Amazon Wish List to ensure foster children at the Children's Home Society received gifts and food over the holiday season.

It's also the little things, like FCC
President and CEO Kurt Kelly stopping by

or helping us pass out Sunshine Health
bags at the DCF Child Protection Summit
in Orlando.

We look forward to partnering with the FCC on more great initiatives benefiting Florida's children.





Guardian ad Litem

Sunshine Health supports Florida
Guardian ad Litem by providing training,
support and resources, because a child
with a GAL volunteer is more likely to
perform better in school, spend less time
in foster care and find a safe, forever
home.

There are 21 local GAL programs in 20 judicial circuit courts and more than 12,000 GAL volunteers in Florida. These volunteers serve as the voice of the child in the courtroom by assessing safety, well-being and risk through interventions and by achieving or ruling out reunification with the parent.

Neiko Shea, Vice President of Sunshine Health's Child Welfare Specialty Plan, serves as a Florida GAL Foundation Board member. She had the honor of presenting the 2018 Florida GAL "I Am the Child" award to the Florida Bar Appellate Practice Session at the Florida GAL Disabilities Conference. The Appellate Practice Session encourages attorneys to do pro bono work to serve the children in the program.

Other events included the 19th Judicial Circuit GAL Program in Fort Pierce for a Partners in Permanency Presentation to educate and train GAL volunteers.



Children's Week

Sunshine Health was proud to once again be in Tallahassee in 2018 to celebrate Children's Week, an annual event designed to remind lawmakers to keep Florida's children at the forefront of their minds as they make decisions during the Legislative session.

Dozens of community partners, educators, lawmakers, corporate supporters, parents, teachers, volunteers, healthcare providers and nonprofit organizations came together to help make sure all of Florida's children have a chance at a happy and healthy future.

Highlights:

• The week kicked off Jan. 21 with the "Hanging of the Hands." More than 40,000 paper hands were sent in by children from 500 schools, childcare centers and individuals across state. We worked with volunteers to string the hands across the Capitol Rotunda. It's an amazing, tangible

- reminder of the importance of our shared work.
- Sunshine Health was the spotlight sponsor of "My JumpStart to the Real World," a day of learning sessions and motivation put together by One Voice IMPAACT and the Florida Coalition for Children. Approximately 150 teenagers, many of whom are aging out of foster care, learned life skills, such as how to buy health insurance and how to be their own advocate. "It was inspiring," said Neiko Shea, Sunshine Health's Vice President of Child Welfare Programs. "The teens came ready to work and armed with questions about what they'll need to do to transition to adulthood. We're honored to be part of their support system."

Medicaid

Medicaid is the government benefits program for people whose income is insufficient to pay for private health insurance. Most of our Medicaid members are children under the age of 21, pregnant women and people with disabilities or chronic medical conditions.

Sunshine Health works to connect children with needed care, including regular well child visits, immunizations and preventive screenings.

We work to engage our pregnant members in prenatal care as soon as possible to improve birth outcomes, and offer a variety of programs that provide extra supports and services for women with high-risk pregnancies.

Our case management program provides members with disabilities or complex medical conditions personalized care and services to help them achieve and maintain optimal health. This program also supports recently hospitalized members to ensure they transition home smoothly and understand their medications and treatment plans.

In 2018, Sunshine Health care managers helped more than 70,000 members with personalized care plans.

Child Welfare

Approximately 40,000 children receive physical and behavioral healthcare through Sunshine Health's Child Welfare Specialty Plan. We coordinate with state agencies to provide unique, high-touch care for these members so they can have dependent and consistent healthcare even as their living situations fluctuate.

Sunshine Health provides Florida's only specialty health plan designed for children in the state's child welfare system.

Children in the state's child welfare system have experienced life-altering trauma. Some of them have never seen a pediatrician for a wellchild visit, or received the care they need to keep them healthy. We bring together healthcare providers and social service workers to address each child's unique needs.

Our coordinated care approach involves partnering closely with Community Based Care Integrated Health (CBCIH), the organization that represents the 19 lead agencies that managed the state's child protective services. These agencies have care coordinators that help us serve our members at a local level. CBCIH enables us to share critical health and child welfare information among the many organizations involved to ensure every person making decisions for children have all the necessary information.

Long Term Care

Sunshine Health's Long Term Care (LTC) plan is designed for seniors and people with disabilities and/or complex medical needs who also qualify for Medicaid.

Sunshine Health is Florida's largest LTC provider, serving more than 40,000 members.

We strive to help members live — and thrive — in their communities by offering care management and supportive services tailored to members' unique needs.

We provide person-centered care planning that focuses on the member's goals — whether that's leaving a nursing home, being able to use a walker instead of a wheelchair, or enjoying activities outside of their home more often.

Our LTC plan is nationally recognized for its success in transitioning our members from nursing homes back to the community to live more independently. In 2018, Sunshine Health assisted 1,865 members in transitioning from nursing homes to family homes and other community options.





Healthy Kids

Sunshine Health provides managed care services for roughly 10,000 Florida Healthy Kids members. Sunshine Health contracts with the Florida Healthy Kids Corporation to offer the Sunshine Health Stars Plan for children between ages 5 and 18 who are not eligible for Medicaid. Sunshine Health offers the state's only full-pay Healthy Kids plan.

Ambetter from Sunshine Health is one of the largest Marketplace health plans in Florida with more than 400,000 members in 2018.


Ambetter offers several coverage options designed to fit different needs and budgets.
